GET TO KNOW OUR NEW BOARD PRESIDENT



WE SAT DOWN WITH ELLIOT MARER '92, OUR NEW BOARD PRESIDENT, TO HELP THE AHS COMMUNITY GET TO KNOW HIM.

AHS: How did you first get involved at Associated?

EM: I first got involved in Associated because a Bet Hayaled principal at Kamin asked me if I would help out on some committees of the school when our eldest son was in junior kindergarten – I spent a few years on different committees helping out on various projects that came up and was eventually asked to join the Board.

AHS: What are some of the benefits of being involved in the community?

EM: We are a small community in a big city. Getting involved has shown me how different and diverse the Jewish perspective can be within this small community. The importance of supporting the community regardless of you personal beliefs is so important as we can only count on each other as a Jewish people.

AHS: What does AHS mean to you?



EM: As a graduate of the school I remember the impact the school had both in my Jewish Values, but also in my academic strength as I transitioned to public school. As a child, after your actual home, school is where you spend most of your time during some very important foundational years. To me AHS has always strived to be a place for all kids to thrive in Jewish traditions, while modernizing its teaching approach. In light of October 7th and the significant rise of anti-semitism in Toronto, AHS plays a very significant role in shaping a large number of Jewish leaders for this city and the world.





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UNBOXING LITERACY

In the Spring of 2024, our Grade 6 Literacy students enjoyed the "Story Boxes" project. They had the opportunity to choose any children's picture book that tells a story, and then create a box - kind of like the setting of a puppet show - to illustrate their story. They created props based on characters and objects from the book, and then retold the story to AHS's Bet Hayeled students in an interactive way.

For Literacy teacher **Jennifer Shapiro**, who pioneered the project, this has been a long-awaited venture.

"When I was in the Faculty of Education, this was one of the projects that we did in our Teaching Language course. I chose a book by Itah Sadu called *Christopher Changes His Name*, and my box was decorated with the names of all of the students who were in my class when I was a student teacher. I always wanted to bring this project to Associated... last year was the first year that I had the opportunity to try it, and it was a real hit. We decided to do it again this year."

There are some students who participated in this project in ways that they haven't participated all year, speaking with newfound animation and confidence, because they know that they are speaking about a book that's accessible to them, and that they're telling a story to kindergarten or Nursery students. They can demonstrate their oral speaking skills in a way that's less stressful than formal public speaking, and it's less pressure than being marked on a traditional assignment.

Some of the students were a little nervous about presenting - but afterwards, they realized that the Bet Hayeled students really enjoyed listening to the story, and that they liked the way they felt when they got positive accolades from the younger kids.

This cross-curricular activity brought together our Middle School scholars with our youngest learners, uniting our student community through the power of storytelling.







PLAYING WITH LANGUAGE

Our Grade 7 students finished off the 2023/2024 school year with a unique project in Ivrit class - creating their own Hebrew games. This Final Summative Task found students reviewing the grammar that they had learned in class all year, referencing their vocabulary words, and collaborating with classmates as they worked on this creative task. Using dice, spinners, homemade boards, and many other props and pieces, the games began to take shape.

An important component of this FST was for each game to be educational, and to serve as a vehicle to teach players about Israel. This sent the message to the students that Israel is always on our minds and in our hearts. Another significant part of the FST was the connection between school and home. Learning becomes most meaningful to the students when they take what they have learned and use it outside of the context of their classroom. To this end, students tested out their board games at home with family members, and then presented videos of the experience to their classmates and teachers.

Mazal Satou, who pioneered this project, explains how it came about.

"When we were learning remotely, I wanted the students to continue studying the way they do in class at school, and I knew that I wouldn't be able to do the exam. So I came up with the idea for the FST. Everything that we learned throughout the year was in the FST - communication skills, comprehension, listening, reading, and writing. All of these components. Plus I knew that if the students knew that there was an FST, they would come to class and they would learn. Because we all like to play board games as family. And I thought, what about creating a Hebrew game that they could play with their family? The students then had to video themselves playing the game with their family in Hebrew."

When the time finally arrived for the students to present their games in class and play them with their classmates, everyone was so proud of what they had accomplished.







In June 2023, to honour Ora Shulman at the conclusion of her service as Head of School, former AHS Presidents Shawn Goldberg and Elaine Osher established the Ora Shulman Legacy Fund at AHS. While the fund had not yet been formally launched, it received a number of additional donations, and Ora Shulman has put a great deal of thought into where this fund should be directed. We are now proud to unveil it as the Ora Shulman **Entrepreneurship Award.**

We were thrilled to sit down with Ora Shulman herself to learn more about this award, what inspired it, and how it works.

INSPIRING STUDENTS TO ENTREPRENEURSHIP:

THE ORA **SHULMAN LEGACY FUND**

WAA: Where did the idea for the **Entrepreneurship Award come from?**

OS: I have always held a very powerful image of children as ethically-minded, resourceful problem-solvers and creators. Through our teaching here at AHS, we have always guided our students to see the challenges of the world as their challenges, and with technology advancing so rapidly, today's youth have incredible tools at their disposal, along with some fantastic ideas that we have already seen. This fund can offer kids the funds needed to not only generate innovative ideas to solve real-world problems, but actually test and even implement those ideas.

WAA: What is your vision for the Entrepreneurship Award?

OS: We will be opening applications up to AHS alumni who are currently in high school. A group of AHS staff and students will review the ideas described in the applications, and the top 3 applicants will be invited to present their idea to our students at AHS, for a panel of judges. The winning applicant will receive an award of up to \$1,500 for the purpose of bringing their idea to fruition.



WAA: What are your goals for this program?

OS: We know at AHS that process is very important - the act of putting their idea into writing, and of sharing it with an audience, will do a great deal for all the applicants in helping them to refine their idea, their pitch, and their skills as innovators and entrepreneurs. All applicants, even those who are not ultimately selected for the award, will gain valuable skills and learn more about what it means to be entrepreneurs. Our current students will benefit greatly from watching the selected pitches, taking inspiration for their own innovative endeavours. And, of course, we will play a part in helping the successful applicant to launch a product that can make a meaningful positive impact on the world.

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MAKERSPACE: WHERE CREATIVITY MEETS POSSIBILITY









At AHS, we have long believed in fostering in our students a Maker Mindset, offering them spaces, resources, skills, and opportunities to innovate and iterate, to hone their creativity, entrepreneurship, and other 21st-century skills, and to collaborate with one another as they design creative solutions to real-world problems.

While these skills are regularly employed and developed organically in the classroom, the Makerspace at each campus is a hub for hands-on learning and creation and innovative, out-of-the-box STREAM (Science, Technology, Religion, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) learning activities.

It was a great honour on November 5, 2024 to unveil the newly-renovated **Honey and Barry Sherman 3"L Makerspace** at our Posluns campus. This room, named for **Honey and Barry Sherman 3"L**, honours the legacy of two incredible pillars of the Toronto Jewish community.

Kaelen Sherman, mother of AHS Nursery student **Liam** and future AHS student **Noam**, shares how she was inspired by the incredible impact her parents had for the Jewish community both here and abroad to carry that legacy forward.

"When people ask why I give to Jewish causes, I answer that if we don't give, no one else will. Especially since October 7, it's important to continue to support Jewish causes and strengthen the Jewish community, in Toronto and around the world. We need to continue what they did, continue the community."

Kaelen's vision for the Honey and Barry Sherman z"l Makerspace is a place for children to feel inspired to use their imaginations and be creative - a place where they can be themselves, connect to their Jewish identity, and experience true belonging. AHS staff will make use of the resources and cutting-edge environmental design of the room to best support students as they question, ideate, experiment, troubleshoot, and build, working together and across disciplines to explore, solve problems, and bring their ideas to life.





AHS UNITED WITH ISRAEL

On October 7th, 2024, we commemorated the atrocities that were committed against Israel one year prior, and those that have continued each day since then. As a Jewish nation, we have been through so much - and we are standing strong together.

In order to prepare for this sombre day, each Danilack class learned about a hero - someone who selflessly thought of others while the unthinkable was happening all around them. Drawing on the stories of Israeli heroes from the past year featured on the website Yeladim Giborim, each class chose a person to focus on and delved into that person's story. The students reflected on the strength and bravery of these nurses, medics, IDF members, and regular civilians whose actions inspire us all. At our commemorative assembly on October 7th, representatives from each class spoke about these heroes, and honoured the memories of those who are no longer with us.

The song "Acheinu" echoed through the halls as hundreds of students sang together. The meaning was clear: we are all one family. With freedom comes responsibility. Living in Canada as we do and feeling, at times, so far away from our homeland, we have the responsibility to speak out against terror, and to support those in need.



Itai Sagi's story of resilience and rebuilding was deeply meaningful and inspiring to our students, offering hope even in very difficult times.

Mrs. Frieberg's deep connection to the school didn't end there; she continued to share her story with our Middle School students for many years, and she became a dedicated supporter of AHS, making her mark on its community for years to come.

Now, Mathew and Lindsay are fully immersed in the school's parent community, where they feel the warmth of the community and a true sense of belonging. Their daughter Mia has thrived, with a particular love for the Hebrew language. From Hebrew-language activities to the memorable SK play, the family cherishes how AHS nurtures their children's academic and cultural growth. They were amazed by how quickly Mia learned and loved reciting daily Tefillot, her excitement in sharing songs for the Jewish holidays, and her genuine love for and strong connection to Israel.

For Mathew and Lindsay, selecting Associated was about more than academics—it was about finding a school that reflects their values and helps shape their children's identity. Despite the distance they travel each day, they have never doubted their decision. "It's worth the drive," Lindsay shares. "The academic excellence, combined with the values of community and Jewish identity, makes it the perfect fit for our family."

As enthusiastic members of the AHS community, Mathew and Lindsay are eager to contribute through volunteering, committee involvement, and active engagement. They are dedicated to ensuring that the school remains a place where their children and future generations can thrive.

ATHLETICS AND INSPIRATION: MR. J

Known as "Mr. J" to the kids, Corey Jocelyn has long been a pillar of our AHS staff - a source of motivation and inspiration to his students both in and out of the Gym, warmth and support to his colleagues, and always a friendly face in the community. We sat down with him to learn some of his secrets to the success of AHS's Athletics program.



What brought you to AHS?

After I finished my education degree, my first job was at AHS. Once I got to know all of the staff and families, it became a home to me, and I have been here ever since!

What was it like when you first started at Associated?

I have been at AHS for 18 years. When I first came to Associated Posluns, there were no school teams, minus a hockey team that was run by the parents. We started the JDSSL, the Jewish Day School Sports League, and every year, we added more and more teams - we have now at least 10 to 12 schools participating in our league, and it all started within the walls of Associated Posluns.

Have you always taught Gym? Do you have a favourite sport?

Yes. Since starting at AHS, I have always been a Gym teacher. I wouldn't say I have a favourite sport, but the first sport I really started to enjoy when I was a kid, and one that I continue to love, is baseball.

Is your family into athletics as well?

Yes, I have two daughters, a nine-year-old and a six-year-old, who are now starting to get involved in more and more athletics outside of school. I've had the pleasure of coaching my older daughter on a softball team throughout the summer. My younger daughter is now doing competitive gymnastics, and Kensie just recently made the Durham Youth volleyball team.

How do you use sports to teach life skills?

I believe that Physical Education class is the perfect environment to help kids learn about themselves and grow as individuals. Students learn how to overcome challenges and persevere when learning new skills, while gaining important social skills such as cooperation, communication, and teamwork.

What makes AHS's Athletics program stand out?

The Athletics program at AHS is geared towards helping students reach their potential as individuals and as athletes. Students are encouraged to continue to enhance their skills through hard work while also having an emphasis placed on helping make everyone around them better. AHS provides plenty of opportunities for students to compete - on school teams, during intramurals, and in Gym classes.

What is something that your students would be surprised to know about you?

My students would be surprised to know that I completed my education degree in Australia!

Over the years, I've really been starting to learn more and more Hebrew. I start to use it as much as I can in class. The kids get a kick out of it because they know that they know more Hebrew than me, but I always try my best to put a smile on their faces:
