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STREAM SNAPSHOT

At AHS, we integrate STREAM education into our daily learning in both General and Judaic Studies. Thinking of science, technology, religion, engineering, arts, and math as independent entities is not enough for today's learners; our students need to know how to manipulate, innovate, and create, and how to look at the world through a multidisciplinary lens. STREAM learning creates critical thinkers, and enables the next generation of innovators to build upon what came before and reach new heights.

The Makerspace is the perfect location for students to develop these skills. Students can engage in 3D printing, 3D modelling, coding, robotics, and even woodworking! In addition to integrating STREAM into the curriculum in the Makerspace, our "portable Makerspace" supports us in continuing to prepare students with critical 21st-century skills in all of our classrooms.





The Makerspace isn't the only space for out-of-the-box learning; at Hurwich, our students also benefit from the Weisfeld Learning Commons, which is far more than just a school library. In this innovative space, students receive coding instruction as a 21st-century literacy skill alongside the more traditional literacy skills that they engage in during their visits to the library. Coding and understanding technology is the next phase of important educational skill sets. We empower our students to not only use but also understand and create technology.

Our innovative spaces help to support students learning, and extend their thinking and creativity. At Posluns, the Grossman Design Studio, along with the Makerspace, is up to date with the latest technology, and promotes collaboration. Students can learn about cooking and woodworking, bring their designs to life using a 3D printer, and work on coding projects with a range of devices and programs.

Posluns

Grade 4 students at Posluns learned how to use the CoSpaces app, which teaches coding in integration with virtual and augmented reality. The students brought the text of Megillat Esther to life, by using details from the text to create to create a Purim scene and then "walk through" it to explore.

Kamin

For Kamin STREAM Night, timed to coincide with the week of Purm, we create a reverse Purim carnival in the spirit of "ונהפוך הוא" (turning things topsy-turvy): Instead of coming to play carnival games, our talented students design and create the attractions themselves, and welcome parents and peers to try them out!

Danilack

Danilack students participated in STREAM Day, for which each grade works on projects using all of the elements of STREAM. This year, Grade 6 students were tasked with designing and building toys with working electrical circuits. Students in Grade 7 competed to build the sturdiest bridge made out of popsicle sticks, while Grade 8 students built creative devices using hydraulics and pneumatics.

BUILDING MORALITY IN THE FACE OF A CHANGING WORLD

Middle school students have a lot to navigate in the face of a changing world. **Rabbi Saar Rozen**, a longtime educator at AHS, tries his best to imbue his students with the strength and confidence in their Jewish identity that will carry them forward throughout their lives. We sat down with him to speak about how he does this with his classes.

How did you introduce the topic of morality and Jewish identity to your classes?

It started with a video that I showed my students to try to inspire them. I wanted them to think about something deeper before starting Tefillah. It had to do with gratitude and they liked it. They wanted to see more.


It became a springboard for discussion that carried over to other topics. We started talking about the 10 Commandments and how they apply to everyday life. For example, did you know that the mitzvah of Shabbat is the first recorded law about protecting animals? The idea of treating animals humanely isn't new - it's a principle of Judaism. We've been doing it for thousands of years.

What kind of thought processes are you trying to cultivate in your students through these discussions?

It's important for the students to learn about multiple viewpoints and perspective-taking. Many of them think that in a machloket [difference of opinion] between Hillel and Shammai, one is right and one is wrong - but they're both mentioned as legitimate opinions in the Talmud. So I ask them, "Can you think of a way that they can both be right?" Then they evaluate which side has more merit.

At the same time, moral equivalency can be a problem. Today, everything is reduced to sound bytes and social media videos, and people don't stop to consider the facts. So I try to take time in my classroom to talk about how Judaism views morality. It's not "my way or the highway" but our moral compass has to have some clarity to it.





How do you address some of the challenges that the Jewish people are facing now?

As a Judaic Studies teacher, I feel like I have to teach my students about what is clearly good. Lots of things are muddled now. People are protesting in support of evil. I want to show my students the value of authentic Jewish thinking. I teach Torah, Talmud, and Tefillah. It's not a lot of time per week, compared to all of the other things that the students hear and are exposed to. Students are constantly hearing from outside sources and social media influencers - but they don't hear the other side. The mitzvot are still relevant to life today.

We are proud to have educators at AHS like Rabbi Rozen who continue to expose our students to new viewpoints and ways of thinking, helping them to build strong Jewish identities and values that will bolster them as they move through our changing world.

SHABBAT: WE'VE GOT IT COVERED!

It takes commitment, dedication, and a lot of heart to spearhead a volunteer initiative. **Stephanie Kepecs** embodies these qualities. With three boys who attended Associated, she was always very involved in the Parent-Teacher Association (now AHSPA). She brought her passion for fibre arts to AHS by volunteering for projects that required quilting.

Stephanie introduced the "Challah Cover Project" to AHS more than 10 years ago, along with her team, with a goal of providing the students with an experiential learning activity to make their Shabbat unit really come alive. "I have to give credit to **Ora Shulman**," Stephanie states, as the former Head of School was very open to the idea.

The students selected fabric from a wide variety of choices, and created their own challah covers depicting a Shabbat scene. The first year was a success - and Stephanie has been back every year since then, bringing with her a team of dedicated volunteers. "We do it in memory of **Esther Zeppieri g"L**," Stephanie explains. "She was the president of the Association, and always very involved."

Stephanie chose to focus on Grade 2 for this project because the students have enough tactile skills to do the activity, and because it fits in perfectly with their Chagigat Shabbat celebration. She estimates that AHS students have made at least 1400 challah covers to date!



"What I like about this project is that kids are better at it than adults. Adults simply cannot produce what kids produce. You see it in their joyful colour combinations, and in their fearlessness with their fabric selections. One little boy had tiger print as his flames, and it looked so good. An adult would not have picked that they just wouldn't have. Each one is incredibly fantastic and unique. Each challah cover represents the child perfectly."

Where does all of this wonderful fabric come from? Stephanie buys all of the fabric from a quilting store to donate for the activity. "I'm a bit of a fabric snob," she admits. "Good quality fabric has great colour, so we only get the best fabric."

Another beautiful aspect of the challah cover project is inviting the students' grandparents into the classrooms to work on the project together. The volunteers then sew the grandparent's name into the challah cover, as a memory of this special time together.

Experiential activities like this one allow our students to make authentic connections to their Jewish identity. "This doesn't stay in the drawer. The challah covers are used every week. And if there's more than one kid in the family, they rotate them." However, Stephanie points out that it's not just the students who can learn something from this project. "As adults, we should learn from their fearlessness and their creativity."

We were so privileged to host Lynn Posluns, founder and CEO of Women's Brain Health Initiative, at AHS on Friday, February 9, for a community workshop on Women's Brain Health in honour of Rosh Chodesh Adar. Rosh Chodesh is traditionally seen as a "women's holiday," and Adar is the month when we increase our joy, making this the perfect time to learn how to care for our brain health to ensure many years of joyful community connections. We welcomed parents, grandparents, Board members, Gouernors, and other members of the AHS community as Dr. Lee-Ron Kaye, Head of School, facilitated a conversation with Lynn Posluns about her work and how we can best ensure our own brain health.

Lynn Posluns and the WBHI provide women with the tools and information that they need to support themselves and their loved ones as they age, bridging the knowledge gap in a field that has long conducted research based only on men's brains, bodies, and outcomes. Lynn spoke about the 6 pillars of brain health, and was joined by Jade Crystal, program director of Brainable, who shared about how this WBHI initiative engages and educates children in schools across the GTA to set them up for a lifetime of positive brain health.



Each attendee received a take-home resource kit to learn more about the food, activities, and personal choices that can best support the health of our brains, courtesy of the WBHI. They also learned about some "brain boosting" exercises that they can do each day to keep their brains sharp - and had the chance to try them out together!

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ASSOCIATED WITH LIFELONG LEARNING

AHS is proud to have offered our staff a series of Lunch & Learns presented by illustrious AHS alumni, as an opportunity to strengthen our connection to the Jewish community and learn about a wide variety of new topics.

Early in the fall, we were privileged to hear from **Rabbi Dr. Martin Lockshin '64**, whose meaningful Lunch and Learn session was featured in our Fall 2023 issue of We Are Associated. His session was followed the next month by **Rabbi Jay Kelman '75**, founder and director of Torah in Motion, who spoke about stories from Tanach and modelled how these stories can be connected to our daily lives and to principles of education.

With **Dr. Dan Held '96**, Chief Program Officer at the UJA Federation of Greater Toronto, we learned about stagnation and growth in the Jewish community, and the impact that this has on Jewish education. After Dr. Held shared and explained the graphs created from compiled census data, we had the chance to discuss what trends we see, and the ways in which this information can be applicable to planning for Jewish education in the GTA in the future.

Looking at the past and planning for the future is a theme that both Dr. Dan Held and **Dr. Seymour "Epi" Epstein '60** incorporated into their presentations. Dr. Epstein shared about his experiences working with Jewish communities in many different countries around the world, such as Morocco, Siberia, and Russia, as part of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee. He demonstrated how supporting children when they are young, and imbuing them with a strong sense of Jewish identity, allows the community to grow and flourish.

The connections that we build with members of our community strengthen us, and are such an important aspect of our identity as a Jewish school. We look forward to continuing this series in the future.







EMPATHY AND INCLUSION

Our AHS students marked Jewish Disability Awareness and Inclusion Month (JDAIM) in February with a range of workshops and learning activities. Students in Grade 5 had the opportunity to work with Reena members on an art activity. This workshop highlighted the many things that individuals with disabilities can do independently, and the students learned that each person can contribute in their own way. Everyone worked together to make posters about inclusion, and the end result was a beautiful and meaningful resource that can be shared with other students.

Students in Grade 6 participated in a workshop called "Empathy and Sensitivity Training: What Do You Say After 'Hello'" led by AHS parents. The students learned about visible and invisible disabilities, and that they should never make assumptions about another person's abilities. They also learned practical strategies that can be used to include individuals with disabilities at recess, in class, and in the community. Students thought critically about their surroundings, brainstorming what barriers to access are present in schools and what steps they could take to create an environment that is inclusive and welcoming for everyone. A main takeaway from the workshop was the imperative of treating each person with kindness and respect, and not to look down on anyone. A simple smile and conversation can go a long way.

Students in Grade 7 learned about putting themselves in others' shoes in a workshop that brought the principle of "V'Ahauta L'rei'acha kamocha" to their day-to-day lives. Called "Through My Eyes," it challenged students to complete a series of activities that demonstrated what a classroom environment is like for students of varying levels of physical abilities. The students learned that the same situation is experienced differently by different people. This helps develop empathy, and an understanding that different people need different things in order to succeed.

Many thanks to AHS parents **Darron Hill, Gabi Krug, Naomi Saperia**, and **Jody Yoken** (Beit Issie) and **Nicole Lipsey** and **Sabrina Propper** (Reena / JF&CS) for leading these meaningful workshops for our students.

Though February is Jewish Disability Awareness and Inclusion Month, empathy and inclusion are values that we emphasize throughout the year. We appreciate all our community members whose efforts help to make AHS's community an inclusive and welcoming one.

At AHS, we are always associated with Israel. Our love for Israel continues to be embedded in everything we do at the school, helping us to build our students' connection with their homeland.



YESH LANU MAZAL - WE'RE LUCKY TO HAVE HER: MAZAL SATOV

Mazal Satov, a parent of alumni and one of our lead Judaic Studies educators, has been at AHS for 23 years, and describes the school as her second home and second family. She continues to be at the forefront of planning innovative programming for our students and community and creating incredible outcomes, both academically and socially. Her name means "luck," and we are lucky to have Mazal with us. We were thrilled to sit down with her for a short interview about some of the incredible things she's done and where we are going together.

What did you do before coming to work at Associated?

Before coming to AHS, I was a social worker specializing in juvenile delinquents. I worked at an institute for juvenile delinquents in Israel, and for a little while, I ran the place.

How did you get started with that?

When I was in high school, I worked with a boy who came from a very dysfunctional family, and I decided that that's what I wanted to do: I wanted to help kids. So I went to university and studied social work. I started working at the institute with kids aged 11-18, and then I went back to university and specialized in working with youth.

How has your role in the school changed over time?

I started out as a teacher in the Danilack Middle School. I taught Torah, Tanach, Mishnah, Talmud - anything that they asked me to teach. But at one point it turned into just Ivrit, which I was very happy about.

When I started to teach lurit, a colleague and I came up with the idea to start writing units that connect to each other and that the students would be able to relate to. This led to me becoming the department head, and working with the teachers and the students on a higher level in lurit.

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Can you tell me about an example of the community that exemplifies our school?

We had an alumni reunion in February. It was the first time we had something like that and it was amazing. I think we should do it more often. It was great to see the students who graduated from Associated, and to see how far they went and how successful they became. I haven't seen many of them over the years, and I loved to see that they still remember Associated and the fun times they had here. They had such good memories, and they were happy to see one another. There were people at the reunion who hadn't seen each other in years. All of a sudden, they're standing together sharing their experiences, and talking about what they're doing now. It was a great idea, and I think it was a great success.

What are your thoughts on the direction of our school?

I am very happy with the way Associated is now. Many kinds of families can come together, and the students can learn to accept each other. I think that if we continue in this way, it's going to be great. I have always loved being here; but now, with the way that we have become a community school, it's wonderful. I am glad that it will continue being this way.

When a student graduates from AHS, they never really leave; they are still in our hearts, and are always a part of our AHS family. This year, we welcomed some of our alumni back home for a couple of very special "family" reunions.

This year, especially with everything happening in Israel and around the world, we wanted to reconnect with our alumni, bringing people back to share strength with one another. We started small, with a virtual 50-year reunion in December for AHS alumni of '73 and '74. We enjoyed warm reminiscences with Neal Applebaum '74, Laya Bloom '74, David Koschitzky '73, Joanne Perlmutter '73, Allan Ptasznik '73, Jackie Rosenblat '74, Steve Weinstein '73, Fred Winegust '73, and Barry Zagdanski '74. The success of that event bolstered us to try for something even bigger and better in the following months.

In February, we invited university-aged students who graduated from AHS in 2015-2019 to join us for an evening of connection and reconnection. We are filled with pride to see how our alumni have grown into adulthood and are on their way to becoming leaders and scholars in every discipline.

"Spending eleven formative years at an elementary school as they grow into young adults is a big part of their childhood, and it leaves its imprint," says Ora Shulman, Director of Advancement and the driving force behind both of these reunions. The evening began with a beautiful Haudalah service as our alumni all linked arms and sang along. Tables were filled with a variety of foods and beverages. The phrase "remember when..." was heard throughout the halls, as graduates toured the building and reminisced about their experiences as students - which, for some graduates, began at the age of 3 or 4 years old! Some of our classrooms



have been remodelled, and spaces have been added to accommodate our growing population - but the Associated spirit has remained.

The evening concluded with a raffle and a slideshow that captured our alumni's years at Associated. We have always taken joy and pride in our diverse population as a community school, and though many of our alumni are now on different paths, they were truly excited to share their journey with each other.
